Democrats OK multiparty judicial endorsements

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A bipartisan agreement calling for cross-endorsement of major judicial candidates in Westchester and other 9th Judicial District counties cleared its first major hurdle last night, winning overwhelming approval by the Westchester Democratic Executive Committee.

Under the agreement, which will go before the Westchester Republican Executive Committee tonight, the two parties pledge their support of specific candidates for judicial office this year, in 1990 and in 1991.

This year, the two parties would support state Supreme Court Justice Samuel Fredman of White Plains, a Democrat now lawyer Albert J. Emanuelli of seat.

Next year, under the proposal. Emanuelli would resign from the Supreme Court late in the year and run for surrogate with support from both parties. Running for his Supreme Court seat and getting the endorsement of both parties would be Westchester County Court Judge Francis Nicolai of Thornwood. In the final part of the deal, the Democrats would support Westchester Family Judge Adrienne Hofmann Scancarelli of Mount Vernon, a Republican. for re-election while Republicans serving by appointment, as well as would support Yonkers City Judge two Republicans, Justice Joseph J.
