Dear Ms. Lee.

I have still not heard from Mr. Waldman – although I left a further message for him at about 4 p.m. on Friday, September 24th, with Liana – an intern in the office – who, after checking, told me that Mr. Waldman was unavailable. She could not answer when he would be available or when a face-to-face meeting might be scheduled. Nor was she able to confirm that Mr. Waldman had received the primary-source materials I left with Adam Skaggs on July 27th – or my exchange of e-mails with him from August 10th onward – which I had requested that you ensure he have.

Time is of the essence. The Brennan Center has a powerful opportunity to advance recusal reform in New York State by its *amicus curiae* participation on my Appellate Division motion – which I have delayed serving since August 10th.
