ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ:
Senator DeFrancisco.

SENATOR DeFRANCISCO: I rise to proudly move the nomination of Eugene F.

Pigott, Jr., of Grand Island, as associate judge of the Court of Appeals.

We had a Judiciary Committee
meeting yesterday, we have reviewed his
qualifications, and the nominee was
recommended unanimously by that committee to
the full Senate for his confirmation.

Briefly, I would just like to say that I've known Judge Pigott. I know not only that he is an excellent judge, an excellent lawyer, but an excellent and wonderful person with integrity that we need on the bench.

I particularly applaud the Governor's appointment because Judge Pigott has common sense, good experience from actually being in the trenches to try cases.

1 And I think that's a quality that all judges should have that are passing upon the results 2 of various trials that take place in courts 3 4 below. He is a man of integrity and a man 5 that we really are proud to recommend to the 6 full Senate. 7. 8 And to second that nomination, I 9 would like to call on Senator Dale Volker. ACTING PRESIDENT MAZIARZ: Thank ς **1** 0 11 Senator DeFrancisco. 12 Could we just have a little bit of 13 order in the room, please. Senator Bruno. 14 SENATOR BRUNO: 15 Thank you, Mr. President. Thank you, Senator. 16 I am just going to add a comment to 17 Judge Pigott and really commend the Governor 18 for such a fine selection of an outstanding 19 individual who has in his life so far 20 accomplished some great things. 21 And he probably couldn't have done 2.2 23 those great things without his wife, Peggy, 24 who is there by his side; without his 25 daughter, Martha, that's there on his left;

and without his son, Captain David Pigott, who is at this time in Iraq and we hope maybe on the Internet, following this proceeding.

This is a distinguished family,
this is a distinguished gentleman, this is a
man who has excelled in his life in public
service. And we are really proud to have this
nomination on the floor.

And I know that all of us here will be proud to be supportive and to see you go on, Judge, in the great work that you have been doing in the great tradition of the judges of the Court of Appeals in this state, who most of the time make great decisions and right decisions. And on occasions they do some things that may need your diligence and your review, but that will come with time.

Thank you very much and congratulations to you. God bless you and your family and your work. Thank you to your son for his valor and his bravery and being in service just keeping people free throughout the world. You can be proud of him, as you are of your daughter, who I know is an outstanding individual, and your wife. You

1 have a great family, and you are an 2 outstanding individual. 3 Thank you, Mr. President. 4 ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: Thank you, Senator Bruno. 5 6 Senator Paterson. 7 SENATOR PATERSON: Thank you, 8 Mr. President. 2.29 I just wanted to add my voice to Senator Bruno's, who certainly complimented ⇒ 10 11 Judge Pigott and spoke well of the Court of 12 Appeals. Listening to his comments, I got the · 13 feeling Senator Bruno thought that he should be nominated to the Court of Appeals today. 14 15 But as good an idea as that might be, short of 16 it, I think Judge Pigott will serve with 17 distinction. Judge Pigott was going to be 18 19 speaking and attending a dinner in Rochester 20 this evening, and he told them that he had to 21 come down to be confirmed today, and they 22 said, "Well, Senator Paterson is going to be 23 there." So Judge Pigott is going to try to

get back up to Rochester as soon as he can,

and then, just to make sure that he doesn't

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get there and get further agitated by my acts today, I will be there as well.

But for a long period of time in the Appellate Division, the judge has served with distinction. This is certainly a fine nomination by the Governor.

I just wanted to clear up the fact that we are not in any way impugning the reputations or the great work of any of the outstanding appointments that have been made to the Court of Appeals, to the Appellate Division, or anyone else. But we're just pointing out that, as the famous inscription on the great courthouse in New York: "The administration of justice is the firmest pillar of good government."

has to include all the talented people around the state who happen to be women, half of the state's population; happen to be
African-American, 16 percent of the state's population; happen to be Hispanic, 15 percent of the state's population; or Asian, 9 percent of the state's population.

There is great talent, great

1 ability, great service, great distinction, and 2 certainly documented evidence of it in candidates all around this state. We are just 3 arguing that they be considered so that they, 4 5 who have that kind of talent, can serve all 6 along with those of outstanding talents such ું ક_{ં,} 7 as Judge Pigott. . 8 And my congratulations go out to 9 him. I never met the judge's son, but I have 10 met his very lovely wife and daughter earlier today, and I know they're proud of him. 11 12 he will make this state even more proud of him 13 than we've been to this point because of his 14 outstanding service that rendered this nomination today. 15 16 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: 17 Volker. 18 19 SENATOR VOLKER: Mr. President. And I can't deny that this is a very proud day 20 21 for myself and for Western New York. 22 There has been a hoax in Western 23

New York that there hasn't been a judge on the Court of Appeals since Judge Jason, Matthew Jason, who actually was the chief judge.

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A friend of mine and a former

Assemblyman -- I think he was from Western

New York -- Dick Wesley, who is a very close

friend of Gene's also, was a judge for a

while. But of course he was making such rapid

progress that he moved on to other things.

But the appointment of Gene Pigott represents, in my opinion, another one of the great appointments of Governor George Pataki. And I've said this before, and I'm going to say it again -- this is the last appointment, barring some disaster or whatever, that Governor Pataki will make on the Court of Appeals -- I personally believe that -- I've been in this house 32 years, 34 years in both houses -- no governor has ever done as good a job, in my opinion, with appointments as George Pataki has.

The process, by the way -- it's a little frustrating occasionally, because there isn't the kind of guarantees there used to be that if the Governor wants somebody, that he can get them. I can assure you that, you know, there's been a couple of incidents where the person that George Pataki wanted was

turned down by his own committee. But that's part of democracy. I've often said some people say there's too much democracy, but I guess it depends on your perspective.

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But Gene Pigott was one of a cadre of people who were reviewed by the fitness and selection committee, and despite the fact that we had somebody yesterday who objected to the process because she didn't know anything about it -- unfortunately, who knew nothing about the whole system, but that's beside the point -- it's a great system. And we have probably as good a judiciary as any place in the nation.

But we do need somebody as assistance on the Court of Appeals to make sure that all the people in this state, in my opinion, are represented. And we need somebody who doesn't decide that he or she should make decisions against the wishes of the majority of people represented by the Legislature.

I can only cite a Carter-appointed judge in Michigan who may have impugned the President of the United States' ability to

secure this country with a decision on wiretapping and so forth. It is not the place of the judiciary to make decisions that override generally accepted law. And I only mention that because I think it's important.

But I will say this about Gene, and I've known him for many, many years. In fact, he became a judge because of the unfortunate illness of a very close friend of mine, Judge Wolf, who is still around but very, very ill, and the death of another very close friend of mine lifted him to -- or the -- well, she died a little after, later, Dolores Denman, who was also very close to Gene and to all of us, who was a classmate of mine in law school.

And I told the story about how I admitted to the chief judge that actually Dolores Denman was my choice for chief judge of the Court of Appeals. But it was pretty obvious why; we were great friends, and she was a good person.

But Gene Pigott has always been a model of judicial conduct. And he's very, very popular with the judges in Western

New York. And that's not just the younger

judges, because you must -- I assume that you understand, those of you that practice law, that there's sort of a diversity of judgeships. And some of the older people get a little crotchety sometimes about some of the younger people that do things.

But Gene Pigott has always been a person who will talk to everyone. In fact, and I will say this, on several occasions where he had decisions to make on cases, he did call me and called other lawyers. One of them that was mentioned was the \$75 -- or the increase in assigned counsel fees. And both of us agreed with that, by the way, but the law was otherwise. And he did say to me, "Are you people in the Legislature going to do that?" I said, "Don't worry, we'll take care of it."

But my point was that even though he realized that his own personal feeling was on behalf of the litigants who were asking for the changes, they wanted a judge to make the changes rather than the Legislature. That's not the way it's supposed to be done. And he agreed with that, and he took care of it.

1 So all I can say is that Gene is, 2 in my opinion, a true moderate. And I was challenged by the idea of moderation by my 3 friend in front here. But by that I mean he's 4 a balanced person who I don't expect to always 5 make decisions, by the way, that I agree with. 6 7 Most people don't, but that's neither here nor 8 there. 9 But seriously, he's a person I 910 believe, though, that is fair and just and 11 will make decisions I think that, generally 12 speaking, this house will feel is proper for ់ ំ។ 3 the Court of Appeals. · 14 13 And very important, Gene, I wish you the best of luck. I also want to say from 15 16 my good friend and your good friend 17 Tom Reynolds, congratulations. 18 ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: Senator 19 Nozzolio. 20 SENATOR NOZZOLIO: Mr. President, 21 on the nomination. 22 Mr. President and my colleagues, I rise with great pride in endorsing 23 wholeheartedly Governor Pataki's nomination of 24 Judge Gene Pigott to the United -- to the 25

New York State Court of Appeals. Got ahead of myself.

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It's interesting that Governor

Pataki's first appointment to the Court of

Appeals, Dick Wesley, a number of years ago

was from the Fourth Department, and Gene

Pigott, our nominee today, is from the Fourth

Department. And as Senator Volker indicated,

this very well could be the Governor's last

appointment. So that's a nice sandwich for

Western New York.

And that certainly we look to

Judge Pigott as being certainly extremely well

qualified for this position, but, as

importantly, he has earned this position. He

has earned the right to go to the Court of

Appeals because he's been an outstanding judge

at the trial court level, at the appellate

court level. He understands the court system

and, more importantly to us, understands

Western New York.

That I am very proud that he has been chosen for this important position. I know he will serve with great distinction and that he does us all honor. We're proud to

1 know him and very proud that this nomination is moving forward. 3 Thank you, Mr. President. ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: Thank 5 you, Senator Nozzolio. 6 Senator Smith. SENATOR MALCOLM SMITH: Thank 8 you, Mr. President. On the nomination. 9 I rise to support the nomination of 10 Justice Gene Pigott, who clearly has had a distinguished record in the Appellate 11 Division. 12 13 But more importantly than that, in 14 addition to being a Vietnam vet -- of course 15 which we all know is near and dear to many of 16 the members in this chamber -- I will tell you 17 that I knew he had humility when I ran into 18 him in the cafeteria today. And there he was, 19 by himself -- I think his wife was with him. 20 They were strolling through the cafeteria like 21 they were workers up in here in the chamber. 22 And you would have never known this is a 23 gentleman who was about to become appointed to 24 the highest court in the State of New York.

And it was then that I recognized that that

kind of humility will only do the bench well.

But I would be remiss also,

Mr. President, if I didn't at least, for the record and to my colleagues who are here,

underscore what Senator Paterson also raised earlier. And that is the importance, as we go forward, in terms of diversity on the bench.

while we obviously know that we are not the ones that hand up names to the commission, who hands it to the Governor, we do have the authority to either vote yea or nay on those particular nominees. And it is very clear to me, given the way things are on the Court of Appeals as of right now, there will be a tremendous void with regard to diversity.

And therefore it is my hope that as we move forward we'll be very sensitive to that issue. Sensitive because, as you know, the public clearly will have more confidence in our justice system if they recognize that there is a bench that is rich with the same diversity that we have in the State of New York.

We have 55 appellate justices in

1	the State of New York, two of which are
2	African-American, two of which are Hispanic,
3	one of which is Asian. And clearly that being
4	the back bench for the Court of Appeals in
5	terms of where they are selected from, it

7	particular Appellate Division represents what
. () () () (we have as a rich diversity in the State of
9	New York.
10	But I am proud to support the
* 11	nominee. I think he will do a great job. And
12	I'm quite sure his wife is happy that this day
13	has come.
14	Congratulations to you, Judge.
15	Peggy, also to you too.
16	ACTING PRESIDENT ROBACH: Thank
17	you, Senator Smith.
18	Senator Rath.
19	SENATOR RATH: Thank you,
20	Mr. President.
21	I rise to support the Governor's
22	nomination and congratulate the Governor on
23	such a wise choice.
24	I am happy to see Peggy,
25	Mrs. Pigott here and Martha here, neighbors

and friends from Western New York.

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Judge Pigott and I started out together many years ago. And Gene was always -- pardon me for calling you Gene, but that's what it is -- always smarter than the rest of us and worked harder than the rest of us.

And in his very first venture into public life, he was not successful. And so you see what happens to people who are not successful on their first venture; they ascend to the highest court. You see those were successful on their first venture, we labor in the fields.

And that's not saying that the judge will not be laboring in the fields, because I know his work ethic. And he will be laboring in the fields.

And as you know, I was married to a judge, a Supreme Court judge, who, when Gene Pigott ascended to the bench, was delighted because he knew that there was someone of judicial temperament. And however the decisions came out in my husband's opinion was one thing, but if you have judicial

temperament and a respect for the law and the bench and the bar, that was critical.

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And I've heard that reflected in the comments of others. Senator Smith just a moment ago said something that reflected that thought, and Senator Volker and Senator Nozzolio reflected those thoughts.

His experience is far and deep beyond - before the bench, county attorney, clerk of the county legislature. I remember the days well. And so I know from work ethic as to what we're going to see from this judge.

And I'd like to read you just a small piece that appeared in the Buffalo News today, and these are Gene Pigott's own words:
"'I don't think I'm much smarter than this body or any other court,' said Pigott,
pointing out unpopular decisions he has made because a law may have expired. He added that statutes passed by the Legislature have to 'be the basis of any decision we make.'"

I think that's reassuring to legislators, Judge Pigott. And I know that there are decisions that you have made that I have not agreed with. But what I do know

1		beyond that is that I trust you, I trust your
, 2		personal decisions, I trust how thoughtful you

21		colleagues, in support of this nomination.
22		I've known Judge Pigott for a
23		number of years in Western New York. He's
24		fair, he's honest, has a high degree of
25		integrity. An excellent appointment by the

Governor to the court.

Judge, when one of the clerks said to me -- they asked me if I thought that you would be a little bit upset by the fact that we had to do the East Greenbush Little League resolution before we did a nomination to the Court of Appeals. I said, "No, Judge Pigott worked in the Erie County legislature. He'll understand this stuff that goes on here."

But again, I want to congratulate Judge Pigott, most particularly his family, and most particularly his son David, who's watching via the Internet in Iraq today.

And, Judge, you were here on a very difficult day for us with the resolution that we had. And I would just ask you, Judge, during the confirmation process yesterday in front of the Senate Judiciary Committee one of the people who testified in your behalf talked about the importance that you placed upon legislative intent when you made your decisions during the course of your legal career.

And I would only implore you to remember the victims of crimes. I think all

too often victims or their families, in the 1 instances when someone is murdered, they look to the court. It's their only place that they 3 can look to for justice for those individuals 5 who are no longer here. 6 And I would just ask you that in 7 the weighty decisions that you have coming before you in the future on the court that you 8 9 keep those individuals in mind. A lot of , 10 those people have a rather low economic station in life. They're not professors, 11 12 doctors, lawyers, senators; they're not in public service. But they're human beings, and 13 14 they deserve justice just like everyone else. 15 So I would only implore you and ask 16 you, and I know that you will, from your past record, keep those victims of crimes in mind. 17 18 Mr. President, I wholeheartedly 19 endorse this nomination.
