President Bush (Exhibit "U") have <u>refused</u> to provide us with any information as to the basis upon which Andrew O'Rourke is a suitable candidate for a federal judgeship.

Or course, Mr. O'Rourke was the "sacrificial lamb" for the Rupublican Party in 1986 when he agreed to run against Mario Cuomo for the governorship. Indeed, it is not only Mr. O'Rourke's federal court nomination which is pending before the Senate Judiciary Committee, but that of Michael Kavanaugh, who, likewise was recommended by Senator D'Amato for a judgeship. Perhaps you will recall that in 1986 Michael Kavanaugh ran on the Republican line for Lieutenent Govenor (see footnotes #41, #61).

The story behind Mr. O'Rourke's nomination for a judgeship to which he is <u>not</u> qualified embraces the big political names on the NY Republican scene--Anthony Colavita, as well as Jonathan Bush (pp. 19-20). We believe that the involvement of Jonathan Bush, brother to the President, facilitated such--otherwise inappropriate--nomination by the White House.

Perhaps such blatant politicization of the federal judiciary by politicians such as Senator D'Amato (pp. 19-20, 24, 29-32) is not new. However, the failure of the Justice Department, the American Bar Association, and other organizations to conduct appropriate screening (pp. 29-38) is a story that has not been told—and must be. As our letter to Senator Mitchell sets forth, a dangerous situation presently exists.
